**BOARD OF EDUCATION:** The Heartland Board of Education is made up of 6 elected board members. They serve a 4-year term with 3 members elected every 2 years. Current board members are: Brian Rader, President; Galen Friesen, Vice President; Mark Briese, Secretary; Gary Braun, Treasurer; Kerri Kliewer, and Sharon Zierott.

**ADMINISTRATION:** The Heartland Community Schools administration includes Dr. Norm Yoder, Superintendent, beginning his 20<sup>th</sup> year; Blaine Friesen, 7-12 principal, beginning his 20<sup>th</sup> year, and Ron Pauls, elementary principal, beginning his 33rd year. All three administrators have Masters degrees, two have Ed.S. degrees, and one a Ph.D. degree. The three have a combined total of 73 years in administration. Because of the testing and assessments required by the state, Cindy Huebert helps as curriculum coordinator, Title I, K-8 Guidance, and assistant principal.

**FACULTY:** There are 34 full-time and 7 part-time certificated staff. Sixteen of these have a Master's degree.

**<u>SUPPORT STAFF</u>**: There are 6 full-time and 22 part-time support staff.

**CONTRACTED SERVICES:** The Heartland Community Schools - Henderson/Bradshaw is a member of the ESU 6 Special Education Cooperative which provides for special services, including special education, speech/language services and pre-school services. The cooperative is made up of seven school districts in York, Fillmore, and Saline counties as well as other ESU 6 schools that wish to participate. Heartland has in the past received Calculus, and Anatomy & Physiology by way of distance learning, a two-way audio/video connection with other school districts in Southeast Nebraska. German I is broadcast from Heartland this year.

**STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT - 2003-2004 SCHOOL YEAR:** The Heartland Community Schools - Henderson/Bradshaw students take the California Achievement Tests (CAT) in grades 3 - 8. The national % tile scores for grades 4, 6, and 8 are as follows:

\* Caution: Because not all seniors take the ACT each year, the percentiles do not necessarily reflect whole class achievement. Additionally, this fact makes it difficult to compare years or trends in ACT figures. Over the past 5 years, 90% of Heartland seniors have taken the ACT. In comparison, only 77% of the seniors in Southern Nebraska Conference schools have taken the ACT; only 70% statewide; only 67% nation wide. This high percentage tends to lower the overall average when such a high number take this test.

## **NEBRASKA STARS – School Based Teacher-led Assessment and Reporting**

**System:** Heartland Community Schools – Henderson/Bradshaw aligned its Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies objectives to the Nebraska State Standards, which state what all students should know and be able to do. This year we will assess student learning in Language Arts and Math. The assessments, developed by local teachers during a series of workshops coupled with national standardized tests, measure student learning. In addition, students in Grades 4, 8, and 11 will participate in the statewide writing assessment in February 2004. Reports of student achievement for all districts in the Math assessments will be published in the fall of 2004. Local teachers are developing Science assessments this year with testing to begin in 2005-2006, for Science and in 2006-2007 for Social Studies.
