BREAKFAST/LUNCH PRICES



Breakfast and lunch prices have been set for the 2010-2011 school year. Lunch prices for students in grades K-6 are \$2.50 per meal and students in grades 7-12 will pay \$2.60 per meal.

Students who qualify for reduced price meals will pay \$0.40. The Huskie meal for 9-12 students will pay \$2.00 extra. Adult employees will pay \$3.10 per meal and visitors will pay \$3.70 per meal. Breakfast will continue to be served during the 2010-2011 school year for \$1.25. Students who qualify for reduced price meals will pay \$0.20.

Also, kindergarten students will have their afternoon milk included in their lunch accounts. Afternoon milk for kindergarten students is 25 cents per day. This is entered on your child's lunch account every two weeks. We ask that all families keep their lunch accounts in a positive balance. We need your cooperation to see that your child always has a positive balance. A call and/or a note will be sent home with your child when the account reaches a balance of \$10.00 or below. Please make every effort to send money when you receive the notice.

The "No Child Left Behind Act" Calls for New Requirements of the School District

The new federal legislation included in the "No Child Left Behind Act" requires that schools release the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all students in grades 9-12 to any military and/or college recruiters that request them. Parents have the right to request that this information not be released without their permission. All parents of students in grades 9-12 will receive a letter with a waiver form attached. This form needs to be filled out and returned to the school to block your child's name from being released. If you do not receive a letter and form, please call the school office and one will be sent to you. If you have any questions, please call the school office for further information.

ASBESTOS NOTIFICATION

The Environmental Protection Agency regulation requires that all patrons and employees of the Heartland Community Schools-Henderson/Bradshaw be notified as to the location of asbestos-containing materials in the school building.

Recent inspections conducted by ATC Environmental, Inc. of Omaha confirmed earlier inspections conducted in 1983 that there is pipe insulation containing asbestos particles in several locations in the Henderson Attendance Center. These are located in the old gym, the stage, and several maintenance storage areas. Although the pipe insulation does contain asbestos particles, ATC Environmental Inc. found them to be properly encapsulated and therefore pose no threat to the students or employees of Heartland Community Schools. Management plans, as required by law, have been filed with the State Health Department and should the materials become damaged in any way, the proper action will be taken by school personnel to insure a safe environment for all students and employees. School Superintendent Norm Yoder and Maintenance Director Matt Quiring have received special training, as required by the EPA, to deal with any asbestos related incidents. If any employees have questions or observe any damage to any asbestos covered materials, they should contact the superintendent's office. A detailed diagram of existing asbestos locations in the school building may be obtained from the superintendent's office. A copy of the management plan is available for public inspection in the superintendent's office.

TYKE Preschool Now Taking Applications for Peer Students for 2010-11 School Year

The Heartland Community School has provided early intervention services to preschool-aged children for over 20 years through TYKE, which stands for Talking for Young Kids' Education. TYKE is run by the Educational Service Unit #6.

Each year, TYKE invites parents of children ages 3 to 5 who have age-appropriate abilities to apply for their child to be peer models for the program. Parents of these children pay a tuition fee, with financial scholarships available to those families who qualify. Sessions for the 2010-11 school year will begin August 23.

The inclusion of peer model students serves two purposes: to provide modeling opportunities for the children who are verified to receive early intervention services, and to provide a more natural preschool environment that represents the make-up of the community. Our goal is to have an even ratio of peer models and children who qualify for early intervention services.

Every effort is made to accept all peers who apply or to recommend other area preschools to the parents if the TYKE sessions are full. TYKE sessions will run 4 half-days per week, with 3-4 year-old children attending in the mornings and 4-5 year-olds in the afternoons. Parents may choose to send their children for two, three, or all four days.

TEACH YOUR MIDDLE SCHOOLER NOT TO SET REALISTIC ACADEMIC GOALS

Your child may be a whiz when it comes to completing assignments on time. But how well does she actually study? That is, how good is she at reading and absorbing material when there's nothing to hand in?

Studying isn't the same as "doing homework," because there's no particular task to complete. Instead, a successful study session hinges on your child's ability to go over text or materials and retain the information for later.

To help your child study more effectively, encourage her to:

- Take notes on what she's reading. It'll help her distill the material down to its most important parts.
- Make flashcards or other aids. She may be more apt to use study tools she's created herself.
- Pay attention to illustrations and charts. These textbook "extras" often contain valuable data that may appear later on a test.
- Describe what she's just read in her own words. If she

• can't, it's very likely she didn't understand the material in the first place.

Of course, even the best study habits won't pack much punch unless they're used regularly--and in the right environment. To ensure your preteen gets the most out of her study sessions:

- Have her hit the books at the same time every night.
- Limit distractions. But that doesn't have to mean total silence. If she works well while listening to music, that's fine.
- Keep a dictionary out in the open. Yes, it's bulky and old-fashioned. It's also priceless. So get it down off the shelf!
