As the calendar turns to December, we will begin to prepare ourselves for colder weather and the eventual arrival of the winter season. Over the coming months the potential will exist for us to have late starts or school closures due to weather and hazardous, travel conditions. Weather-related decisions regarding late starts and school closings will always be made with the highest regard for the safety our students, parents, and staff.

Information related to late starts or school closures will be shared in a variety of ways to help ensure that you have access to this information in an accurate, timely, and reliable manner. This information will also be provided via phone and email our automated messaging service, School Messenger. Our goal will be to make decisions as early as reasonably possible in order to provide parents, students, and staff with as much advance notice as is possible. If decisions can be made the night before a late start or a cancellation, we'll communicate that information no later than 10 PM. If closure decisions cannot be made the night before, our goal regarding early-morning decisions will be to communicate with you between 6:00 AM - 6:30 AM.



our Heartland FFA members competed in the Nebraska State Land Judging Competition: Faith Hiebner (12), Riley Quiring (12), Lane Farrall (12), Madalyn Janzen (11), and David Hiebner (11, alternate).

The Heartland FFA Land Judging team qualified for the State Competition in Polk County, where the team placed second. On October 22nd, the team traveled to Lake Wanahoo in Wahoo, Nebraska to compete in the State Competition.

Each of the four competitors from each chapter are split up into four groups, where they individually evaluate soil and land characteristics like slope, texture, and depth to determine its capability for different uses.

After the competition was complete, the team traveled to the Saunders County Fairgrounds to hear the results. Riley Quiring placed 12th, Lane Farrall placed 14th, Maddie Janzen placed 30th, and Faith Hiebner placed 83rd. Overall, the team placed second and qualified for the National Competition in Oklahoma, which will take place from May 5th to May 7th.



Heartland FFA members competed in District Livestock Judging

Members have been studying for the contest over the course of the last month with study session trips to Kim Siebert's for cattle, Emma Ott's for swine, as well as Sarah and Makaelyn Goertzen bringing in sheep. Participants judged classes of breeding gilts, breeding ewes, market lambs, breeding does, market goats, bulls, market cattle, and keep/cull heifers. The district competition is split into a junior division and a senior division. The junior division is composed of freshmen and sophomores. The senior division is made up of juniors and seniors. Heartland's Junior team placed 6th out of 15 teams, and 181 participants. They were just 24 points from qualifying for the state competitions. The top four junior scores were Willabelle Panko (17th), Katy Farrall (18), Kayleigh Frisbie (39), and Ashlyn Rotter (50). Heartland's senior team placed 9th, with a total of 111 competitors. This team was just 50 points from making state. The top four senior scores were David Hiebner (11), Emma Ott (26), Colby Frisbie (41), and Lexi Ingslbee (61).









The National FFA Convention was held from October 28th to November 1st in Indianapolis, Indiana. Tours were attended while heading to the convention, as well as tours in the area. The group toured Northwest Missouri State University, Trans Ova Genetics, Brock Angus Farm, Ozark Fisheries, and Hunters Honey during the trip. The group attends these tours to broaden their knowledge on agricultural industries in other states and other agriculture pathways.

Seven Heartland FFA members attended the Convention, as well as two advisors: Braden Janzen (12), Madalyn Janzen (11), Weston Panko (12), Grace Splinter (12), Lane Farrall (12), Riley Quiring (12), Trenton Goertzen (12), Stephanie Miller (advisor), and Allison Engelman (advisor).



All sessions for the convention were held in Lucas Oil Stadium.

The students all had a great time and learned a lot at the 98th National FFA Convention.




