

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2020 - 2021 Heartland Quiz Bowl & Mathematics Teams



The Heartland quiz bowl and mathematics teams have been

busy this spring. The first competition was the SNC quiz bowl tournament held in David City. Heartland was able to enter two teams consisting of five members. After a few practice rounds, the double-elimination bracket was set up and both teams performed well. The highlight of the day was when both Heartland teams competed against each other. It was a close match with the A team pulling out the win. Both teams were able to play and win multiple rounds before heading home, both finishing in the top half of the 17 teams in attendance from the conference.

On March 24th, eight students traveled to Nelson, to compete in the Lawrence-Nelson quiz bowl tournament. The tournament is set up differently than most, but we adapted quickly and through three rounds, the team was able to score enough points to compete for the championship. When the last question was answered, the score was tied. Sandy Creek was able to answer the tie-breaker question and we left Nelson as the runner-ups.

Twelve students traveled to Seward to compete in the ESU 6 tournament. Heartland had two teams and it was a tough day for both teams. Unfortunately, both teams lost in the first round of the single-elimination tournament.

In April, eight students woke up early to attend a new quiz bowl event at Osceola. Each team made up of four students were able to compete in seven rounds and they did a great job. The last competition of the year took place on May 5th and was the Underclassmen tournament in Seward. Heartland took two teams and both of them ended up in the top half of the competing teams.

The mathematics team was able to attend the annual Harvard Math Day on March 29th. The day consisted of three different competitions. The first event was a "Fast Math" test that required students to answer mental math questions in a timed situation. The students then moved on to the written math test that was used to seed the teams for the "Math Bowl" bracket. Both teams ended up seeded in the top half of the bracket. The day was full of impressive results with both math bowl teams ending up in the top half of the competition. The following awards were also earned: Kale Wetjen 4th place in Fast Math and 8th place on the written exam. Eli Hiebner finished in 9th place on the written exam and Aaron Goertzen finished in 10th place on the written exam.

Our seasons would not have been as successful without the help of some special people.. Mrs. Gina Mestl, Ms. Marietta Adams, Mrs. Stephanie Buzek and Mrs. Rebekah Onnen graciously helped both teams by providing additional supervision and transportation when there were two teams competing. Thank you to Mr. Matt Quiring for making sure we always had a vehicle or two ready to go for our early departures. Thank you to Mrs. Charlotte Greenwall for making sure fees had been paid and we had money to make our traditional trip to DQ. Special thanks to the three Seniors, Tobin Glinsmann, Lauren Quiring and Cooper Regier, who have been dedicated to both teams for the past four years. New Artwork for the Elementary Library



The students were taught a valuable lesson on saving money while discussing the concept of saving, how interest makes money grow, how to budget and determining financial needs and wants. The importance of owning and depositing into a savings account at a bank was stressed to keep money safe and out of harms way.

To encourage the students to save, each student was given a \$10 Savings Certificate inviting them to open or add to a savings account at Henderson State Bank (Henderson, York or Greeley) or Giltner State Bank. An additional \$10 will be added to the savings account the following year to reward the student if they continue to save.
