UPDATE ON PROPERTY PURCHASED FROM KROEKER GRAIN

National Concrete Cutting Inc. began its demolition work on the district's recently purchased bin site in mid-February. This demolition and clearing work involves clearing all of the structures and removing various concrete pads and footings. The district will attempt to leave some of the flat concrete in place for the time being (e.g. the concrete under the flat building adjacent to the alley). Leaving some of this existing concrete in place might allow for some immediately useable parking space on the site without incurring additional costs. Weather permitting, the demolition, clearing, and leveling of the site should be completed by mid-March.

H&H SPORTS COOPERATIVE

The boards of Heartland Community Schools and Hampton Public Schools both approved a sports coop agreement in February. The cooperative sponsorship agreement includes all sports currently offered at Heartland as well as cheerleading. All programs except high school football will begin competing as a cooperatively sponsored team this coming fall. High school football will begin competing as a cooperatively sponsored program in the fall of 2026.

The cooperatively sponsored programs will compete as the H&H Bearcats. The official colors will be black, white, and silver. Final mascot selection was completed by a student vote on Monday, February 24th.

Among the first tasks to complete in the newly established co-op will be the hiring and assigning of coaches to the coaching staffs of each sport. That work will begin with the coaches for the upcoming fall sports seasons over the coming weeks. Coaches for the winter season sports will be selected later this spring. Coaches for spring season sports will be selected after the conclusion of the upcoming spring sports seasons.

DAYCARE PARTNERSHIP WITH HENDERSON CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The early childhood facility that is being constructed as a part of Heartland's comprehensive facilities project is on track to be completed by early-summer. Over the past few months, the Heartland Board of Education has been working to secure a partner to operate daycare services in the new early childhood facility.

In January, the board reviewed letters of interest from potential partners who would be interested in operating a daycare facility within the new building. In February, the board selected the Henderson Child Development Center (HCDC) as the preferred partner for providing daycare services inside the new facility. HCDC officials and Heartland's board are currently working together on finalizing a lease agreement that would allow HCDC to operate private daycare operations within the new facility. The Heartland Board of Education hopes to approve a final agreement with HCDC in March. Through this partnership, the district would provide the space/facility to HCDC, and HCDC would provide the actual daycare services and run its operations entirely separate from the operations of the school district.

The new facility will have a total capacity to serve up to 40 children, ages 6-weeks up to 5-years old. Completion of the newly constructed building, as well as HCDC's licensure process will ultimately dictate when the HCDC daycare can begin operations inside of the new facility. August 1st is currently a rough estimate for when HCDC might be able to begin providing daycare services inside of the newly constructed facility. Information about applying for daycare services, operational information, etc. will be provided in the future by HCDC.







Students competed by putting their knowledge to the test in three separate subjects from Business Communication, Economics, Intro to Business Concepts, Supply Chain Management, Intro to Financial Math, Personal Finance, Organizational Leadership, Healthcare Administration, Intro to FBLA, and one student participated in a Job Interview.

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In January the FFA hosted an Ag Olympics with FFA members after their regular monthly meeting. FFA families competed in a variety of activities in the South Gym, making sure that each member was able to participate. The activities included Needle in the Haystack (members searched for nuts, bolts, and washers), Feed Sack Stacking, Hog Walking, and Grain Bucket foot race.

In February, 15 members submitted their proficiency applications to district review. This application honors members who, through their Supervised Agriculture Experience(s) have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward future careers. Four senior members' applications were selected to move on to state judging. Katrina Epp in Home and Occupational Safety, Blake Goertzen in Swine Production Entrepreneurship, Diversified Agriculture Production,



and Grain Production Entrepreneurship, Zach Miller in Beef Production Placement, and Thane Wetjen in Specialty Animal Production. Nine members also interviewed for their Nebraska State Degrees: Jacob Buller, Katrina Epp, Cale Friesen, Jace Friesen, Blake Goertzen, Madison Mason, Zach Miller, Sam Quiring, and Thane Wetjen. Two members also interviewed for their State Star and were selected to move on to state judging. The State Star is to recognize members who have outstanding Supervised Agriculture Experiences, and is awarded to students who are applying for their State Degrees. Each district is allowed to submit two members in the following areas: Placement, Business, Research, and Production. Zach Miller interviewed for a State Star in AgPlacement. Blake Goertzen interviewed for a State Star in Ag Production. They will find out in March if they were selected as a top 24 finalists. Finalists will be recognized on stage at State FFA Convention in April.

National FFA Week was to be celebrated during the week of February 17-22. However, due to weather conditions and cold temperatures, we have decided to move our celebration to National Ag Week, which is held March 16-22.

Students in ag classes had several visitors throughout the month of February. Members spent the day with Alexa Tollman, through the Chapter Visit Program. She is a 2024-2025 Nebraska State Officer. She spent the day talking to the members and discussing the importance of staying involved, working together, and gaining knowledge. Ag Science students learned more about the Nebraska Farm Bureau with a presentation by Karah Perdue. Lastly, Central Valley Ag Cooperative visited classes and presented about chemical safety and food safety.

Chantelle Schulz from CVA visited the classroom and taught students about chemcial safety.

This information affects our state funding, it is <u>very important</u> that we have current and accurate data.


