It seems just a short time ago that there were just a few of us in the building, trying to wrap up summer projects in anticipation of the students and teachers arriving for the beginning of a new school year. It has been a good first semester, both in the classroom and through all of the various activities that students are involved with each day,

Our computer purchase two years ago has added an entirely new layer to learning here at Heartland Community Schools. Our approach from day one has been that the technology is a tool, not a "solve all" to the daily challenges of teaching and learning. But, to see how these tools are being used has been inspiring and at a level not experienced here in prior years. For many students at the high school, the laptop has become their central organizational tool, their production machine, their communication link, their research avenue, and their link to different methodologies to learning. In the elementary, the technology has opened a new world of possibilities in how new concepts are taught, practiced, and mastered in the classroom. To see a student not only arrive at the correct answer, but to record themselves explaining their reasoning behind each step of the solution has allowed more efficient access to individual students for teachers and added a completely new layer of accountability for the student.

Many teachers have utilized the technology tools, not only as modern day chalk and slate, but to expand the concept being taught to a whole new level of reasoning and exploration. They have reorganized what they teach to streamline objectives for our online learning system. They have been creative in how they group students within the classroom in order to focus on specific learning styles using technology. Teachers have taught, not only the basic concepts, but how to identify the problem at hand, gather information, collaborate on a solution, and present their information all while utilizing the technology available to them. These are the skills that future employers say they need in hiring new workers.

The laptops and tablets that we have integrated have not fixed all areas needing attention. It was never assumed by us that they would. But, they have provided us with opportunities to teach and learn using the tools that our students will need to be comfortable using in the future. ### FBLA MEMBERS ATTEND NATIONAL FALL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

Fifteen members of the Heartland FBLA chapter attended the 2015 FBLA National Fall Leadership Conference in Omaha on November 6 and 7. This conference provides an opportunity for members and advisers to participate in motivational general sessions, professional development, and career planning workshops.

The members kicked off the conference with a business tour of the Omaha World Herald's John Gottschalk Freedom Center which is the OWH's state-of-the-art newspaper production facility located in downtown Omaha. The tour guide shared information about the history of the OWH and the printing and packaging processes. We toured the Press Hall which features three Man Roland Geoman presses that stand five stories high, weight 1,661 tons and can print 70,000 88-page newspapers per hour and the Packaging Facility which prepares more than 625,000 preprinted advertisements each year. The OWH provides home delivery to 22 counties in Iowa and 47 counties in Nebraska. The OWH has been owned by Berkshire Hathaway Media Group since 2011 and is the 10<sup>th</sup> largest newspaper company in the U.S. based on circulation.

The opening session speaker was Patty Hendrickson from Wisconsin. Her program was titled, "Own it. Grow it. Be it." She's a very energetic speaker who encourages emerging leaders to become role models. The FBLA members attended various workshops on fundraising, networking, credit, international business, financial literacy, time management, community service, dressing for success, social media and other leadership topics. The closing session speaker was Aaron Davis from Nebraska, a member of the 1994 National Champion Nebraska Cornhuskers. He is an expert in the area of attitude and how it impacts every area of one's professional and personal life. Mr. Davis explains many techniques on how to utilize the power of a Champion Attitude to reach your full potential.

The group also enjoyed an evening meal at Stokes in the Old Market. ### Sign Language Workshop for Parents of Young Children

The Heartland Preschool Parent Advisory Committee and the Bethesda Preschool Committee are jointly sponsoring an evening workshop for parents of babies, toddlers and preschoolers. Hillary Veerhusen will be the speaker on Monday, January 18 from 7:00-8:00pm. She will be talking about the use of sign language to support and enhance the verbal communication of young children. The snow date will be Monday, January 25.

Hillary is the wife of Coach Greg Veerhusen who teaches 6<sup>th</sup> grade at Heartland Community Schools. They have three children: Brooklynn is a 2<sup>nd</sup> grader, Kraten is a preschooler, and C.J. is their new addition just this past September. If they are not at a sporting event or watching a sporting event, they enjoy spending time with family that live in and around the Lincoln area, or relaxing with friends.

Hillary works as a school psychologist for Lincoln Public Schools. This is her second year in Lincoln. Prior to that, she spent a year with Aurora Public Schools as a practicum school psychologist. Hillary has worked as a special education preschool teacher in Aurora, Nebraska and in Page, Arizona for 5 years.

As a preschool teacher, she used sign language on a daily basis with both typically developing students and students with special needs to encourage communication growth and appropriate behavioral requests. She has had training in American Sign Language, and multiple trainings on early sign language for kids. As a school psychologist, she has the opportunity to work with students from birth to age 21. When working with the families of our younger students, she often talks about how communication and behavior overlap and how sign language can be used to support both.

On January 18, Hillary will be sharing about the different uses of sign language with babies, toddlers and preschoolers. She will also teach the participants some useful basic signs.



### A \$500 Fine & 3 points off your Driver's License

**STATE LAW:(1)** Upon meeting or overtaking, <u>from the front or rear</u>, any school bus on which the yellow warning signal lights are flashing, the driver of a motor vehicle shall reduce the

speed of such vehicle to not more than twenty-five miles per hour, shall bring such vehicle to a complete stop when the school bus is stopped, the stop signal arm is extended, and the flashing red signal lights turned on, the stop signal arm is extended, and the flashing red signal lights are turned on, and shall remain stopped until the flashing red signal lights are turned off, the stop signal arm is retracted, and the school bus resumes motion. This section shall



not apply to approaching traffic in the opposite direction on a divided highway or to approaching traffic when there is displayed a sign as provided in subsection (8) of this section directing traffic to proceed. Any person violating this subsection shall be **guilty of a Class IV** misdemeanor, shall be fined five hundred dollars, and shall be assessed points on his or her motor vehicle operator's license pursuant to section <u>60-4.182</u>.
