### State FFA

The Heartland FFA Chapter recently attended the State FFA Convention in Lincoln, Nebraska. The convention was held from April 3rd through April 5th for members who had qualified for state competitions and were accepted into leadership development academies. There were many students who did an outstanding job at each of their competitions. We are proud to announce their accomplishments!

The chapter received a bronze recognition in the National Chapter Competition. We received silver for the Hall of Chapters presentation display that several of the seniors worked on. We were recognized for our work in Connecting Chapters, a program to help promote Ag literacy with elementary students.

The Ag Mechanics team (Maverick, Emily, Lisa, Eli) received 44th, with Maverick receiving an individual red ribbon.

The Ag Science team (Tyler, Aaron, Carson, Lisa) received 7th, with Tyler and Aaron receiving individual purples, Lisa a blue, and Carson a red.

The Agriscience team placed 9th out of 113 teams with Tyler Lewis placing 17th individually.

The Agronomy team (Peyton, Jesse, Brooklyn, Lauren) received 82nd, with Lauren receiving an individual blue ribbon.

The Natural Resource team (Wynema, Maverick, Cade, Reagan) received 60th, with Wynema receiving a purple and Maverick a red.

The Farm Management team (Tyler, Wynema, Mason, Maverick) received 72nd, with Tyler receiving a blue and Wynema a white.

The Food Service team (Rachael, Cassidy, Madison, Seth) received 31st, with Rachael receiving a blue. Reagan received 20th in TIG Welding. The welding results have been pulled so that they can re-evaluate the results. It was announced that Bryce received 9th overall in MIG Welding. However, as of right now, we do not know how anyone else or the team did.

Along with team competitions, there were also students who participated in various aspects of convention. Two members were involved in speaking competitions at the state level. Lauren Quiring qualified for Jr. Public speaking and received a silver at state. Tyler Lewis qualified for Extemporaneous speaking and received a bronze at state. Lauren Quiring also participated in the annual Agriscience fair by placing 3rd in the Plant Science division. Brooklyn Epp and Aidan Swartzendruber were members of the State Choir. During state convention there is a courtesy corp made up of FFA members that help the convention run smoothly. Heartland members who were part of the courtesy corp were Madison Miller, Seth Randles, and Cassidy Siebert. Delaney Siebert and Peyton Ott received recognition for their involvement in their Supervised Agriculture Experience. Finally, six members received their State FFA Degree, the highest degree that the State of Nebraska can bestow on its FFA members. These members were: Bryce Allen, Brooklyn Epp, Reid Huebert, Peyton Ott, Delaney Siebert, and Shauna Spencer.

The Agriculture Issues Academy (AIA) is a new event that was held on April 5th that teaches young FFA members about how growing leaders can effectively spread agricultural literacy. There is an application process to attend and only 30 members are selected. Rachael Dente qualified for this academy and learned how to effectively present herself in interviews and radio broadcasts.



### Annual Notice to Parents: Right to Request Teacher Qualifications

Our district receives federal funds for Title I programs. Your have the right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's classroom teacher(s). If you request this information, the district or school will provide you with the following as soon as possible:

- If the teacher has met state licensing requirements for the grade level and subjects in which the teacher is providing instruction;
- If the teacher is teaching under an emergency status for which state licensing requirements have been waived;
- 3. The type of college degree major the teacher has and the field of discipline for any graduate degree or certificate; and
- 4. If your child is receiving Title I services from paraprofessionals and, if so, his/her qualifications.

### Are you interested in becoming a local substitute?

During most times of the year, but especially in the spring, we scramble to find substitute teachers. There is a state permit program that allows for individuals without a teaching degree to substitute up to 45 days at their local school. Please consider obtaining this permit and spending some days with us during the school year!

The Local Substitute Teaching Permit is valid for three (3) years and is limited to forty-five (45) days of teaching in any school year. This type of Permit is valid for teaching only in the Nebraska school system requesting the issuance. This Permit requires a minimum of sixty (60) semester credit hours of college coursework with at least one (1) course in professional Education.

The following documents must be submitted for the Local Substitute Teaching Permit:

- The Application form and non-refundable application fee online at www.education.ne.gov/tcert OR Print, complete, sign, and date the Application form from the Supporting Forms Supporting Forms link at www.education.ne.gov/tcert and your payment by check or money order AND
- Record of Residence Form online if you have lived in Nebraska for the immediate past five (5) years, OR complete a Livescan fingerprint card at a State Patrol office OR two (2) ink rolled fingerprint card(s) and fingerprint fee by check or money order. Order the fingerprint packet at AND
- Official Transcripts indicating sixty (60) semester credit hours of college coursework to include a professional education course. A professional education course is any course with an education prefix or a course in child psychology, child growth and development, classroom management, school organization, child abuse and neglect, observation of children or in general terms, anything dealing with children, schools, or education AND
- Written request from the Superintendent for issuance of the Permit. This request must be signed by the
  Superintendent or the personnel director of the school system. Include a statement indicating that the issuance of
  the Permit is approved or requested by the local governing board.
- Official transcripts for a pre-approved course to meet the Human Relations Training requirement. NOTE: The
  Temporary Certificate, valid for SIX MONTHS, will be issued if the Human Relations Training requirement has
  not been met.

Please give us a call at school if you are interested in obtaining a local substitute permit.


