eartland Superintendent Brad Best was surprised recently when he was presented with the Nebraska Rural Community School Association (NRCSA) Superintendent of the Year Award for 2020.

Jack Moles, executive director of the NRCSA, visited the school in order to present the award in person to Mr. Best.

The organization represents more than 75,000 students in Nebraska school systems, and considers superintendents across the state for this annual award. Best was chosen as this year's winner by a selection committee after being nominated.

During the surprise assembly, Moles spoke of the respect other schools' administrators have for Best and the work he's done at Heartland.

This is typically awarded at a statewide convention in March. The award presentation was delayed due to the pandemic and the cancellations of schools.

Now, with school back in session, the award presentation could be held. Mr. Best's family members were in attendance – they've known since last March that he was chosen for the superintendent of the year, but still were able to keep the secret in order for his grand surprise.

After graduating from the former Geneva High School, Best earned his bachelor of science degree at Dana College, his master's from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and his educational specialist degree from Wayne State College.

Mr. Best began his teaching career in Bellevue but his first administration position came as an assistant principal at Elkhorn Middle School.

He was then the high school principal at Creighton Community Schools in Creighton, before becoming the curriculum and staff development director for Seward Public Schools.

Mr. Best joined the Heartland District in 2012. He is in his 38th year in education.





COVID related grant funding allows for us to offer free meals to ALL students enrolled in Heartland Community Schools. EARLY DEVELOPMENT NETWORK SERVICES COORDINATION

What is Early Development Network Services Coordination?

Services Coordination helps families of children with special needs below age three:

- Find services to meet developmental, educational, financial, health care, child care, respite care and other needs
- Work with multiple providers to make sure services are provided as needed
- Why is Service Coordination Needed?

Nebraska families of children with special needs have found it difficult to locate needed services for infants and toddlers with disabilities and then to coordinate the services with the providers.

Who is Eligible for Services Coordination?

Eligible families are those with an infant or toddler below age 3 who has a disability or developmental delay and qualifies for special education through the public schools.

Year round services coordination is provided.

There is no cost to families.

How Can Families Apply?

To request Early Development services for your child or to refer a child, call the local number below. With prior parental permission, referrals may be made by anyone who suspects a developmental delay in an infant or toddler.



Heartland FFA Chapter of Henderson, Nebraska, named 3 Star Chapter for 2020 National Chapter award by National FFA Organization

INDIANAPOLIS (2, September, 2020/National FFA Organization) The Heartland FFA chapter of Henderson, Nebraska, has been recognized in the 2020 National Chapter Award Program from the National FFA Organization.

The program recognizes outstanding FFA chapters from throughout the country that actively implement the mission and strategies of the organization. These chapters improve chapter operations using the National Quality FFA Chapter Standards and a Program of Activities that emphasizes growing leaders, building communities and strengthening agriculture. Chapters are rewarded for providing educational experiences for the entire membership.

Chapters that received star ratings during judging this summer and will be recognized at the 2020 National FFA Convention & Expo, Oct 27-29.

All star-rated FFA chapters receive honors made possible by corporate sponsor John Deere. Chapters must first go through their state review and be selected as a top 10% chapter. Applications are then sent on to National FFA for review. Chapters are selected as a 1, 2, or 3 star program with 3 being the highest rank.

Heartland Students Load Up on Dual Credits!

Students at HCS are getting a head start on college this semester by enrolling in dual credit courses from Southeast Community College! New this year is the inhouse course Analytic Geometry & Calculus, taught by Mrs. Buzek.



- 21 juniors & seniors are taking at least one dual credit course from Southeast Community College for a total of 34 courses.
- A total of 120 credit hours are being taken this semester.
- 10 of those students are taking a Career Academy which means that they won't pay any tuition! This is a total of \$3,600 in tuition savings for HCS families!
- 24 courses are taken via the SCC DC Advantage program which offers half price tuition! This is a total of \$4,320 in savings for HCS families!
- Classes being taken include: Introduction to Psychology, Introduction to Sociology, American Government, Analytic Geometry & Calculus, College Algebra, Public Speaking, Introduction to Professional Education, and Introduction to Business.

On September 22, Tanya Crawford and Amanda Hackenkamp, York and Polk County Extension Educators, visited Heartland Elementary to discuss the importance of proper hand washing. Their engaging lessons gave PK-6 grade students an opportunity to learn about proper techniques. To practice the skill, students applied a black light lotion to their hands and then washed it off. Finally, students put their hands under a black light where they were able to see the "germs" that they didn't get wiped off. At Heartland, elementary students wash their hands at least three times every school day.

- 2. If the teacher is teaching under an emergency status for which state licensing requirements have been waived;
- 3. The type of college degree major the teacher has and the field of discipline for any graduate degree or certificate; and
- 4. If your child is receiving Title I services from paraprofessionals and, if so, his/her qualifications.
